they currently are.

In order to be able to decide what we might alter, it was important to understand the duties of a full slate of officers, so that we could see what we might eliminate or how we might combine positions. Chippewa District officers each gave a brief report of their duties using a visual symbol for each office. Then everyone present received a written list of job descriptions for each office, compiled by Heartland District's Carol Hornby.

These were useful to officers at all levels—local, district, and conference—because the descriptions showed all the functions that can be covered to provide the richest experience.

Velma Hockenberry, conference UMW historian, also added an explanation of what disd District's Carol Hornby. Then each wrote down h

tricts and local units need to keep for posterity and how to preserve their collections. She gave each district a set of archival safe containers for their holdings.

Our heads full of all this information, and having sung

a new version of our Purpose, written by Mary Scharinger of Winnebago District to the tune "I Love To Tell The Story," we next had an opportunity to dream. Each participant wrote down what drew her to UMW in the first place and what keeps her involved. These answers provided us insights into what makes UMW appealing to new people and what we can emphasize when inviting women to join.

Then each wrote down her dreams and desires for

UMW in Wisconsin at all levels- conference, district, and local- as well as for Mission u (formerly School Of Christian Mission). First we shared these thoughts with the people sitting at our tables and then, using a traveling microphone, with the entire group. Some women dreamed

that we would become more deeply involved in social issues, others had membership concerns, and others had suggestions for structural and schedule changes. A scribe at each table wrote down their comments for

use by the conference officers in future planning.

Next we broke into separate district groups to share again and to do some goal-setting. Here, each woman spoke what she had written and a scribe put each idea on newsprint pages for all to see. Then the district President led her group through a discussion noting which ideas were most important to the group, and those became the basis for future goals. They were seen as having been formed through the prompting of the Holy Spirit whose guidance we had sought in prayer before writing down our individual dreams.

Following this, the President read

the goal that the district officers had prepared for last summer's School Of Christian Mission to see if it still reflected the values of the current thoughts just spoken. If it fit, great. But if it didn't, the group was to decide if they wanted to reject it or work it into the goals just decided. Then, using the job descriptions that all had been given, the group was to decide how their officers would share in making their goals a reality. Would they need the full slate of officers- or might they use fewer officers and some short-term committees set up for specific tasks?

This was just the start of planning for the future. The process will be ongoing, but this step helped us to begin moving in the same direction with a more focused approach.

Interestingly, the districts did not all have the same goals. That makes sense, because of their different geological locations and interests. The idea was to start with the needs and interests at the local level which, then, could be reflected in the district's goals to help meet those needs. And then the conference level will strive to support the work of the districts.

Because we are connected at the national level, there are some initiatives and mission obligations that we

must support, which means the districts and local organizations will need to incorporate them into their planning, as well. But just this once, since there were changes in place by General Conference, we took advantage of the opportunity to look at all the possibilities in Wisconsin and what we saw as needs and goals.

The day closed with a commitment service in which each participant received an "official" S.T.O.M.P. pin. She pinned it on another person as a sign of covenant to follow through with the ideas and goals that were made that day, in order to Spirit-fully Transform Our Mission Purpose.

I extend a special thank you to the Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women (COSROW) and to the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation for grants that helped underwrite our expenses.

Now, I ask you to start moving. No hesitant steps or tip-toeing, but rather, confidently go forth.

STOMP into the future and make United Methodist Women all it—*WE*—can be!

When enough is enough. This year one of the Social Action focuses is Domestic Violence and Abuse. It is a broad topic with many facets and far-reaching repercussions. Domestic violence doesn't just affect one person. It often leeches into the lives of all who are associated with the victims and their families.

How is your unit planning to address this topic? Will you visit a local shelter and find out what needs are being met in your local community? Maybe invite a guest speaker from a community services organization to give a program for your entire congregation? Volunteer to do laundry, scrub floors and do some painting at your local abuse shelter? There are many more things you can do.

Domestic violence isn't one of those things that happens "out there" in other parts of the nation and world. It happens everywhere, even with members of our own congregations.

My father was a California Highway Patrol Officer for many years. The stress took a toll on our family and eventually my parents divorced. No, my father wasn't an abuser. But he didn't like to open up about things that he experienced at work. Eventually my parents grew apart and they ended their nineteen-year marriage. I understand why now. But as an eighteen year old high school graduate with her entire life ahead of her, the trauma of that time greatly affected the decisions I made. I dropped out of college and went to community college. My self-esteem was at a low and I didn't know what to do with my life.

I was blessed to still have my grandparents there for

support, but things were still really tough. I'm not sure what would have happened if I'd actually stayed in school and followed my dreams. I do know that I married the kindest, sweetest and most supportive person I know. We've been



through tough times, too, but we've always managed to stick together and live our lives in Christ.

Others aren't so blessed.

In the coming year, as we consider our New Year's resolutions, I really want you to think about those "others." Remember them. Pray for them. And find ways to support and nurture those who are caught in the vicious cycle of domestic violence. Educate yourselves and others in your congregation to this very real societal issue. Be the change makers that United Methodist Women teaches us to be.

And remember that we are an organization of women who put Faith, Hope and Love into Action for women, children and youth in our communities, across our nation and around the world. God bless and have a blessed 2013!


might look like in 2013. Certainly this means putting God at the center of everything. We must seek to know the heart of God through prayer, praise, thanksgiving and study.

Planning an Observance


We encourage you to commemorate A Call to Prayer and Self-Denial on one day during the first few months of the year.



DRIVING DIRECTIONS TO MISSION ACTION DAY AT TOMAH FIRST UMC:

Coming from the north on I-94: Take the Tomah exit, turn right and that will be Hwy 12 or Superior Avenue. Continue on Superior Ave to Jackson Street or follow the hospital signs. Turn right on Jackson and go to the end of the street. You come to the hospital and turn left on Butts Avenue. Continue several blocks and the church is on the right across from the high school. The parking lot and main entrance is in the back of the church.

Coming in on Hwy 21from the east: At the intersection of Hwy 21 and Hwy 12 turn left on Superior Ave and follow the above directions.

Coming from the south: Take I-90 where the I divides and take the first Tomah exit which comes in on Hwy 16. Continue to the first set of stoplights and turn right onto Superior Ave. Go to Juneau Street (Band Box Cleaners on the left, also a chuch sign) turn left and continue to 4th stop sign and turn right onto Butts Avenue. The church is on the left and parking lot is in the back. The church is across from the high school.

Coming from the west: Take the first Tomah exit, turn left (Hwy 131). Go to the first set of stoplights and continue on Superior Ave. to Juneau Street and follow the above directions.



IN MEMORIAM - LORNA RINCK

We are, first and foremost, Sisters in Christ! We have been Lorna's sisters in Christ.

We have followed the purpose of UMW that says, we are an organized community of women whose purpose is to know God and experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ, to develop a creative, supportive fellowship, and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

We have gone to meetings with Lorna (more than we can count). We have planned programs, planned and presented educational studies with her leadership at School of Chirstian Mission (now known as Mission u).

Together we have explored social action—just at the last Conference meeting Lorna spoke up for the issue of health care access, lack of health insurance and the high cost of medications. She urged us to keep this on our agenda for 2013 because it affects so many Americans.

Together we have explored immigration, poverty, human trafficking, and the high infant mortality rates in Wisconsin. Lorna, our sister in Christ, has helped Brenda Clark, our sister that runs the SERVE store at our District events. Lorna helped check us out and encouraged our buying Fair Trade item and even helped us do our early Christmas shopping. She always spoke to encourage reading of our recommended books. And she liked to help us purchase those books.

One thing I will say is Lorna attended required meetings. She was also known for being a little late sometimes, so we would give her an earlier time just to make sure she was there. Lorna showed her fellowship and love in making prayer shawls—all colors and intricate patterns that she gifted to many others that have served.

I just came from a Christmas party with Lorna and our Chippewa District Mission Team in Medford. Lorna was in a bright red sweater—all decked out, you might say. We had no idea that she was going to be with our Lord so soon. We sang hymns together and even played Christmas Bingo, then we took our caroling over to an assisted living facility that houses one of our member's mother and about 20 others.

This week, in my devotions, I was reading from Micah, in the Old Testament, where Micah, in about 750 BC, warns the people of all the bad things they

are doing. He tells them God will punish them. He asks all people to have faith in God's goodness and mercy and he predicts that someone like Jesus Christ (a leader) will come to lead people to God—the prince of peace—and he asks,



what does the Lord require of us?

As our Sister in Christ passes on to her heavenly reward, we all come face to face with our own mortality. And I ask myself, what does the Lord require of me in the days that I have left here on earth? I am committed to follow a path that will allow me to do what is just, to show constant love, and to live in humble fellowship with God.

I am thankful for the life of my sister in Christ, Lorna Rinck, and her faithfulness and I am thankful for our savior Jesus Chirst.
