

No, the three women were not washing their clothes at the river. They were in the hotel laundry room while their husbands attended General Conference. Getting to know each other in this modern setting, the 'where do you live', 'are you clergy or laity', and other

introductory questions were briefly answered while the machines whirred in the background. One of the women thought about Biblical times, when this activity was an opportunity for women to share life stories. Would the hotel strangers take time to share some personal glimpses into their lives as they clustered in the small, warm room?

Alas, maybe the machines worked *too* well. Or maybe the time was too short. One woman's work was completed all too quickly, leaving just two. Polite conversation centered around Conference observations. But all too soon is was obvious the two women had differing perceptions of people, scientific documentation, and Jesus' teaching to love one another. Even if there had been a month's worth of laundry and quarters had been plentiful, the two women's beliefs would probably never coincide. Actually, one woman could not wait to fluff and fold her clothes in order to politely end the conversation and leave the room.

Yes, I was the lone person left to ruminate on what had transpired in just an hour's time. Did the women at the river discuss justice issues? Have issues become "idols", taking us away from the mission of serving others and making disciples for Jesus Christ? Am I missing something? Is it difficult to understand Jesus' directive to love one another? Why don't we let God do the judging? It was a good thing the dryer stopped and I could close the wonderful dialogue with myself. Who would think a time at the river (laundry) could be filled with so many God-thoughts?

Now, while reading *Immigration In The Bible*, the Spiritual Growth Mission study book, I specifically appreciated being reminded of the following: "As followers of Christ it is important that we realize that Christ is in us and the Holy Spirit is with us. Therefore in everything we do, we are forcing Christ to do with us." Well, God, was my response to the stranger a "godly view and standard of conduct"? Since my response to the stranger was also my response to God, I hope so.

See you at School of Christian Mission for more Godthoughts!!! Thank you, God, for being with us.

SUMMERTIME READING

Ah, summer! I love summer. Two of my favorite parts of summer are School of Christian Mission and summertime reading. Summer is the perfect time to catch up on the Reading Program. But with so many choices (2008-2012 reading lists), what to read?

Of course, all the books in the Reading Program have been carefully selected and are worth a read, but lately I've been paying attention to what others are reading. Here are some recommendations. Which ones have you already read?

Heard at the conference team meeting in April—two recommendations:

Same Kind of Different as Me, by Ron Hall and Denver Moore (2011 Nurturing for Community). If you haven't read it yet, it's a great story, not just of a "modern day slave," but also of homelessness, friendship and faith that sees us through tragedy.

The Perfect Board, by Calvin K. Clemons (2011 Leadership Dev.). Anyone serving on a board or committee should read it.

Two book reviews in district newsletter Capital Comments:

From Merrill Woolnough who reviewed *All Creation Sings*, by J. Ellsworth Kalas (2012 Spiritual Growth): "Kalas drew me in when he moved beyond extolling the virtues of gardens and forested hillsides to Jesus, the cross and daily living in the real world where "thorny" describes personal relationships rather than a bramble in the Conservancy." A good book for a daily devotional or discussion groups.

From Marilyn Eyster who reviewed *Women Lead the Way,* by Linda Tarr-Whelan (2012 Leadership Dev.): "As long as women are under-represented in positions

of power, everyone misses out on the important insights and new perspectives that women can bring to the table."

The Reading Program encourages us to think critically about current issues. Some of the selections may disturb us or make us uncomfortable as we read

about distressing situations, yet they broaden our understanding of mission. We shouldn't shy away from them. Readers in the online community recommend these books (read book descriptions in Reading Program brochure):

Half the Sky, by Nicholas D. Kristof and Sheryl WuDunn (2011 Leadership Dev.).

Forgotten Girls, by Kay Marshall Strom and Michele Rickett (2012 Ed. For Mission).

I Am Nujood, Age 10 and Divorced by Nujood Ali (2012 Nurturing for Comm.)

The Death of Josseline, by Margaret Regan (2012 Social Action).

Because He Lives: Faith, Hope and Love in Action, by Catherine Ritch Guess (2012 Ed. For Mission)—recommended as "one of the best books I've read in a long time" and "one of the best books on the list."

As I write this today, I'm packing to leave on family vacation. The 2012 Reading Program books going in my suitcase? *The New Jim Crow* (yes, kind of heavy vacation reading, but an important topic), *The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind*, and *Ostriches, Dung Beetles and Other Spiritual Masters*.

MEMBERSHIP COUNTS

Of the 309 United Methodist Women units within the Wisconsin Conference last year, 211 local units reported their membership to their district Mission Coordinator for Membership Nurture and Outreach.

As of January 1, 2011, Wisconsin Conference UMW reported 6,241 members, with an additional 208 new members joining throughout the year. Due to deaths and other reasons, 351 United Methodist Women members were removed from the membership roll, lowering the total membership for Wisconsin to 6,098 as of December 31, 2011.

I would like to recognize Chippewa and Metro North districts for having 100% of their units turn in their membership reports. A job well done, ladies!!! Winnebago, Nicolet and Heartland districts were very close.

Local units need to use the greatly simplified reporting form for membership count. If the unit doesn't have a Membership Nurture and Outreach officer, then the report can be filled out and sent in by the Treasurer, Secretary or President. Local unit and District Membership Forms will be explained at the Officer Training Event this fall at Wisconsin Rapids, November 9-10, 2012. Be sure to mark this date on your calendars! District officers are required to attend and I greatly encourage all local unit officers to attend, as well. A representative from Women's Division will be on-hand to answer any questions you might have about anything and everything related to United Methodist Women, including, but not limited to, restructuring of UMW, membership concerns, reporting, resources, etc. So, come with lots of questions and concerns. Also be sure to bring your ideas to share; your involvement with teens and young women; ideas for flexible scheduling of meetings and events; ideas for using resources; and your ideas for how to share leadership responsibilities.

And don't forget to share with other United Methodist Church women in your congregations what it means to be a member of United Methodist Women, where the mission money goes; what educational opportunities for spiritual growth are available; the missions we support; and how we put faith, hope and love into action for women, children and youth in our communities, across our nation and around the world.

Major decisions:

- UMW will separate from the Board of Global Ministries for finance and administration, but will continue to support missionaries and initiatives that care for women, children, and youth-
- There shall be an organization of United Methodist Women in every church, but other women's ministries may be present as well-
- Clergy will no longer have guaranteed appointments-
- There will be no set-aside Bishop to oversee the needs of all the bishops-
- The United Methodist Church will retain the current language in the Discipline that says the practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching-
- There will be no change in governing structure but Boards and Agencies will reduce their membership numbers to accommodate a reduced budget.



WAYS TO REDUCE PRISON POPULATIONS

Greetings!

As we prepare for a long-anticipated summer of activities, I have chosen a topic that seems to be on the minds of many—our prison system. The information that follows is from an article sent by Women's Division from the *Washington FCNL Newsletter*—Sept./Oct.

2011, "Alternatives to Prison."

Because the article is 7 pages long, I have bulleted some main points:

roblems in the U.S. is to use <u>more force</u>. Increase the punishments, lock people up, throw away the key. In particular, this avenue has <u>not</u> been effective in the War on Drugs. However, there are effective programs all over

the country that have succeeded in turning lives around, depriving drug dealers of a market and reducing drug associated crimes.

- Numerous successful programs and techniques can help prevent crime, help communities deal justly with offenders, address mental health and drug addictions outside of the criminal system and help reintegrate former prisoners in the community and the economy.
- The US incarcerates a higher share of its population than any nation in the world. While the US comprises 5% if the world's population,

we hold almost 25% of the world's reported prisoners. Since 1970, our prison population has quintupled, while our population has only grown about 40%. Although crime rates have fallen in recent years, longer sentences and mandatory sentences by state and federal laws

has contributed to increases.

• Keeping a person in a federal or state prison costs about \$29,000 a year. That's about \$74 billion a year nationally. There are additional costs to communities caring for families of those in prison.

The 11X15 Campaign for Justice for safer, healthier communities has been initiated by WISDOM (http://prayforjusticeinwi.org). The program challenges Wisconsin to reduce the prison population from its current size (about 22,000) to 11,000 by the end of the year

2015.

They have created a presentation which is available from its affiliate organizations or on its Web site.

Treatment and alternative programs will help non-violent offenders become productive members of their communities and reduce our prison populations.

have received from districts \$77,863.16 toward our Pledge to Missions of \$340,000 for 2012. Of that \$37,500.60 has been sent to Women's Division and counts toward our pledge. We also received \$8,910.88 in Mission Giving Plus donations. The rest has been held to pay for meeting expenses, Regional School of Christian Mission fees, and programming for districts.

I suppose we should say that since we are half-way through the year, we should have received 50% of the money requested in our budget. But, traditionally, there is a slump from May to August, when units are less active, and a big push at the end of the year. As Paul said of the extremely poor Macedonian

churches, "they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability...they pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints." (2 Corinthians 8: 1-4) They set the mark for giving. So I **THANK YOU** for your generosity thus far and ask you to make an effort to raise funds through the summer and pass them on as quickly as possible.
