## Prepare for Lent and reasons why?

Lent is a season of forty days, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry. Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. Today, Christians focus on relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending ourselves, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of ourselves for others. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter." "Sunday in Lent" rather than "Sunday of Lent" in the naming of these Sundays. On each Lord's Day in Lent, while Lenten fasts continue, the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection. While a day of considerable joy, it might also be a day when the sermon may ask or lament how those who seemed to laud Jesus on Sunday could by Friday morning call for his execution.

This was Palm Sunday, this final Sunday in Lent has been known as Passion/Palm Sunday. Actions recalling the Sunday Jesus entered Jerusalem are limited to an opening procession, while the main part of the service focuses on reading the lengthy story of the final passion (suffering) of Jesus in his betrayal, arrest, trial and execution. A shift from triumph and elation to horror and sorrow happens abruptly within this single service, setting a somber, solemn tone that continues through the rest of the week.

In response to that reality, the Lenten practices of fasting, prayer, and ministry with the poor had evolved into practices of general penitence among the baptized to help strengthen the spiritual lives of lifelong Christians.

The Protestant Reformations of the 16<sup>th</sup> century added more variety to the observances of Lent. Some traditions observed a day called "Passion Sunday" on the fifth Sunday of Lent, but with readings that focused on Jesus' call to take up the cross and follow him, not his own passion (suffering). Palm Sunday observances might occur on either the Fifth or the Sixth Sunday of Lent. Readings for the first five weeks of Lent would focus on living in the way of Jesus. For the sixth Sunday, the beginning of the week of the most intense preparation, they combined a Palm Sunday processional with the reading of the passion of Jesus from one of the synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark, or Luke). That flow created a greater emphasis on the gospel reading for the entire church into the final and most intense week of preparation, Holy Week.

The same ecumenical scholarship that influenced changes which included Methodists, Anglicans, Lutherans, and Presbyterians among others. Daniel T. Benedict's 1997 book, "Come to the Waters," provides clear and accessible guidance so United Methodist congregations can use Lent and Holy Week as originally designed.

Prayer: But in the midst of our weakness, we ask that you would be strong on our behalf. Lord, rise within us. Let your Spirit shine out of every broken place we've walked through. Allow your power to be manifested through our weakness so that others will recognize it is You who is at work on our behalf. We ask that you trade the ashes of our lives for the beauty of your Presence. Trade our mourning and grief for the oil of joy and gladness from your Spirit. Trade our despair for hope and praise. We choose to give you thanks today and believe that this season of darkness will fade away. Amen

**SOCIAL ACTION:** Climate justice and ending mass criminalization of communities of color will remain the social action focuses for the 2025-28 quadrennium per action taken by The United Women in Faith Board of Directors, which met on October 23. Whenever members think that there's little they can do, remind them of these words from our president, Ainise Isama'u: "Each of us is an essential thread in the fabric of our organization; we are not just leaders; we are advocates of change, and we are the voices that speak."

Climate Justice Focus: Bomb cyclones, polar vortexes, derechos, gray swans, weather whiplash, atmospheric lakes, firenados, heatflation, and flash drought are weather terms we are becoming all too familiar with; why? According to meteorologist for Yale Climate Connections, Jeff Masters, "We're now in a totally new climate. The climate of the 21st century has a lot more heat energy in it" which means wetter hurricanes, hotter heat waves, and more devasting droughts as Kyla Mandel, senior editor at *Time* reports in her article "Bomb Cyclone' and Other Weird Weather Words for Our Climate Change Era".

To help us understand these new weather terms, Mandel, in her article, quotes extreme weather expert Jill Trepanier, associate professor at Louisiana State University: "The climate system is in a state of flux as it adapts to a new equilibrium-that is, having more available heat and having to find ways to move or transport this added energy-and in any system, that's when the 'weird' happens." In short, our planet is warming, and as it warms, extreme weather events like bomb cyclones and derechos are becoming more common.

In a November 2023 article on Science X, Yvaine Ye of the University of Colorado at Boulder writes, "Unrelenting wildfires in Canada and Hawaii. Catastrophic floods in Libya. Sweltering temperatures across the globe. These climate disasters, which once would have happened every decade or longer, all took place in 2023." Are you ready for this to become the new normal?

When interviewed in Ye's article, Pedro DiNezio, associate professor in the Department of Atmospheric and Oceanic Sciences at CU Boulder, says, "Scientists have been predicting climate change is going to happen for decades. Now is the time to act, and we should act in a just, fair, and inclusive way, including everyone on this planet." As United Women in Faith, these are words that we can relate to. Climate Justice is one of the primary focuses of UWF. We recognize that climate change does not affect everyone equally and that the most marginalized are the least responsible for it. As the UWF website states, "Protecting God's creation and those disproportionately affected by global climate change is more than our belief; it is one of our core principles."

Are you following the Just Energy 4 All campaign? What are you doing to reduce your carbon footprint?

Sheboygan St. Luke recently did an Outreach program.... We are sharing the program:

Membership, Nurture, and OUTREACH Campaign

UWF members at St. Luke in Sheboygan take outreach seriously, or at least we did in 2023.

A committee comprised of our Membership, Nurture, and Outreach Co-chairs and two active members of our unit concentrated on reaching all adult women at St. Luke who didn't belong to UWF with a personal invitation to join or participate.

The four-part outreach campaign included the following:

- 1. Create a contact list from our latest church directory, including phone numbers, email addresses, and home addresses.
- 2. Send a group letter and a brochure describing our seven circles (see sample below). Contact me if you're interested in a copy of our circle brochure.
- 3. Follow up with a personal phone call two weeks after the mailing using a prepared script and record all responses.
- 4. Track responses or contact information updates on a spreadsheet and share it with the unit president and the church office to update contact information.

I delivered sewn & knitted items to Childrens Services in mid- December.

- United Women in Faith Potluck Christmas luncheon was awesome! Thank you to the 17 women who gathered around the table for fun, food and fellowship!

Our last Bake Sale was on Dec 3rd and profited \$247. Proceeds from our Bake Sales have helped United Women in Faith with their mission giving. Along with paying our Pledge to the District, we disburse all funds at the end of the year to be in mission through organizations giving aid directly to women and children.

### We sent funds to:

\$250 went to Children's Services of Wisconsin in Milwaukee, aiding children and their families in the Washington Park area.

UWF also manages a Used Book & Puzzle Exchange table. .25 for paperbacks, .50 for hard cover books & puzzles! This is an especially popular area at the "Seasoned Seniors" monthly luncheon that is a community outreach of our church....and it's surprising how those quarters add up.!!
