KEEPING THE HISTORY OF UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

The purpose of a historian is to preserve recordings of UMW history and historical events. Each district president shall appoint a historian who will serve no more than 4 years. Appointed historians shall be members of the Executive Committee without vote. For permanent documentation of UMW activities in your district, take a few pictures from each event, along with a written summary of what happened and what the pictures illustrate. Pictures can be saved in acid-free photo sleeves and identified on the back in pencil or on the outside of the sleeve.

The following are additional items to save:

- District newsletters.
 - District directory, if you have one.
 - District Annual Gathering booklet and flyer.
 - Evaluation summary.

Some form of documentation of special events held in your district.

I am currently working with the Conference President and Chair of Nominations to develop further guidelines as to what and when to send to the Conference Commission on Archives and History.

SOCIAL ACTION CONSIDERATIONS

Where to start? That's the BIG question. Everywhere one looks today there are issues that need our attention.

I encourage you to continue to pray about the political activity in our state and to contact your Senator and Representative to support the positions you feel God is calling you to support.

Also, don't forget to keep abreast of our national issues and to also let your congressional representatives know how you feel about them.

I would like to share a sampling of a paper sent to me by Women's Division—"The 9 billion-people question: A special report on feeding the world"/ February 26th 2011 from The Economist. The article explores several topics related to the situation that will arise as we face feeding 9 billion people in the world by 2050.

The following are only general statements and will give you information where you can order copies if you would like more information.

Some information to contemplate:

- "At the start of 2011 the food industry is in crisis." Political and industrial attention is being focused on the subject of food for the world.
- "The era of cheap food has come to an end." Increasing demand, the shift away from cereal toward meat, veg-

etables and fruit, increasing use of maize(corn) as a fuel and other factors such as the fall of the value of the dollar. have all contributed to the present situation.

- With a current projection of the global population reaching 7 million in 2011-2012, and the price rises that have plunged millions of people into poverty, it seems to suggest that the world cannot even feed the current population, let alone be able to feed 9 billion by 2050.
- Global warming also has an adverse effect on production



of food.

- There will have to be increased production of soybeans to support in increase production of meat.
- The production of fuel from corn increases the price of corn. It also uses a large percentage of the crop and takes it away from the food market.
- Technology has increased

production in recent years. There has been research to improve plants and seeds that has led to increased production in many countries. Future research may be able to improve production as much as 50% - still a lot, but not as spectacular as the earlier improvements. CIMMYT, the UN's international wheat and maize research organization is one such organization

- working in this area. • Water is also a real concern. Irrigation makes it possible to use added land. But the availability of water is questionable in the future.
- In both rich countries and poor, a staggering 30-50% of all food produced rots away uneaten. In poor countries, the loss is due to lack of safe storage or inability to get the crops to market in good condition. In rich countries, studies show that much is thrown away. Reasons are habit, laws, and the fact that people have the money to buy more.

As you can see, this is an issue that will have no easy resolution. However, there are possibilities to explore. As you think about this, think about what you might be able to do to affect the situation positively. Bring your ideas to SOCM.

GREEN TEAM UPDATE: CONNECTED BY FAITH, FOOD AND FUNDS

We are all part of connected systems. Some systems we are born into and others we choose.

By faith, you are incorporated into the Kingdom of God and enlisted as workers, sent to reap a rich harvest (Luke 10:2). We go in community and work to bring the light of God into dark places of injustice, despair and destruction. To do this work, we must see beyond ourselves and into the wider vision of God's love for the world. "Connected Wisdom: Living Stories About Living Systems" from the United Methodist Women's 2011 reading list explores this wider view into the depth and breadth of our connections.

One of the most basic connections we have is through sharing food. Our food system not only connects us to creation, farmers, agri-business, and food processors, but also to our neighbors near and far. We are part of a global food chain with real connections to our daily lives.

Shining the light of Christ

onto this maze, however, does not show a pretty picture. Too often our food exposes us and workers to pesticides and hormones, toxic additives, cheap calories and sweeteners and systems profiting only large transnational agri-businesses.

This situation is powerfully illustrated in the PBS documentary "Nourish: food + community". DVDs are available from Interfaith Power and Light as part of the Cool Harvest campaign (www.coolharvest.org) along with congregational actions to reduce carbon footprints, a letter campaign on the US farm bill, a handy seafood guide and set of table graces.

We are connected to many who also seek to apply the lens of faith to problems of food insecurity, environmental degradation, exploitive farming practices and food deserts.

Did you know that our social principles speak clearly to this issue? "A prerequisite for meeting the nutritional needs of the world's population is an agricultural system that uses sustainable methods, respects ecosystems, and promotes a livelihood for people that work the land" (Section III, Q).

We are all invited to the table of abundant life and grace – may we work to make it be a GREEN table.

Finally, we are also connected by funds. Your Pledge to Mission dollars goes to support sustainable and justice-creating mission projects around the world. From seed banks, to fruit trees, sustainable agriculture projects and sand banks, your connection to God's mission is a vital part of reaping the harvest.

For over 140 years, United Methodist Women and their predecessor organizations have worked to bring justice to women, youth and children around the world. It's now our turn to sustain our connection to mission and continue to support the mission work we have grown.
