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Meet Our Wisconsin Deaconess

Kady Herr-Yang My story starts with being available and willing to hear God's call at His timing. I've always felt called to a lifetime of servanthood to God. That's why I always wanted to be involved in serving Him ever since I was a youth. But, I knew that ordained ministry was not for me. I was not sure what the best course of action would be for a layperson.

When I served as a Women's Division Director from 2000-2008, there were many of my director friends who became deaconesses, and I was in awe of their accomplishments. It was through their journey and consecration that I came to learn more about the Order of Deaconess and Home Missioner. And now, I am one of them.

My ministry goal as a Deaconess is to be available to support Hmong patients emotionally and spiritually, who are struggling with illnesses especially the elderly population in the Advocate Aurora health system where I am currently employed as a full time Hmong Medical Interpreter. Spiritual care is without a doubt, an important part of health care and thus hospitals provide spiritual support to patients and their companions every day. By handling these encounters in a compassionate yet professional manner, as a healthcare interpreter, I play a key role in patients' experience when going through emotional moments. I work with chaplains to provide prayers and support as needed. And, I have also helped provide education to providers about the Hmong culture and their beliefs and views of western medicines and treatments.

One of the greatest joys about my ministry is that I get to plant seeds and let God take care of the rest. I'm not a doctor, but as a medical interpreter, I get a glimpse of how they feel when they save lives every day. "I serve neither for gratitude nor reward but from gratitude and love; my reward is that I may serve." This is our UM deaconess and home missioner motto.

Thank you for letting me share my story with you and I hope that my story will help you hear His call to be a deaconess or a home missioner.

Kady, an immigrant, is our first Hmong Deaconess. She was consecrated as Deaconess at our 2022 Assembly.

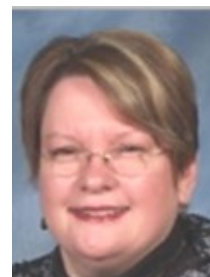

UWFaith Local Units Mission Funds Best Practices:

If we regularly read Response Magazine and many more resources that our organization offers, we should know Where the Money Goes and how it is used, right? We should keep in mind who we are as an organization and how the UMC recognizes us according to the bylaws and the Book of Discipline. In ¶256, Section 5, Article 6 of the BOD gives us instructions and authority for UWFaith to secure funds for mission with women, children, and youth. Here is my abbreviated version:



- a) The organized unit shall secure funds for the fulfillment of its Purpose.
- b) All funds belong to the organization and shall be disbursed only in accordance with its constitution.
- c) The total budget shall include pledges and other money for the program and responsibilities of the national office directed through the channels of giving. Any funds to be used locally*, shall be for administration and membership development**.
- d) The local unit shall make an annual pledge*** to the total budget of the district/conference.
- e) All Mission Giving funds channeled to the UWFaith National Office shall be appropriated by the board of directors, elected by the membership.

These guidelines are straightforward, don't you think? So, that leaves me to say that anything that the local unit does outside these guidelines are not the best practices on behalf of our organization. As women in faith God has given us the wisdom and authority on how to best conduct our lives and our personal finances. Even more so, we should use God given wisdom and authority to administer our organization's finances in the best interest for our organization. I know that we wish we could offer funding to many local, national, and international organizations that reflect our interests, but the reality is that we cannot do everything, and we have chosen to commit to the mission of the UWFaith organization. Let us continue doing so by supporting our five channels of giving, being inspired by the impact that we can make happen if we all contribute and continue to inspire new women in our local units to do the same. I will always remember what a finance chair told me, "God gave us 100% of what we have. We are only giving it back". This is so true! We would have nothing without God's help and strength, all we have has been given to us 100%. Let us give it back to God in a way that it will be pleasing!



***Mission Locally:** The budget category that enables the local group to be in mission in its own area. Items such as contributions to local mission programs are appropriate. Items that are the responsibility of the whole church are not appropriate, such as the church budget or building fund, parsonage upkeep, or groups, such as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and the United Fund, which have community wide sources of support. Where custom and tradition have included inappropriate items under mission locally, careful interpretation will help UWFaith members prepare budgets that more closely reflect the Purpose of the organization. The Budget of UWFaith must support mission programs and projects that depend on the organization basic support.

****Administration and membership development:** Items that enrich the educational experiences and leadership capabilities of local members and that are necessary for the organization's functioning. Appropriate expenditures include dependent care for meetings, postage and printing, program materials, program expenses, attendance at Mission u and other conference and district meetings, ecumenical mission programs, and other items relating to the UWFaith.

*****Pledge to Mission:** The total amount that the group expects to send on to the district treasurer. The unit should consider all sources of funds available such as pledges, gifts and offerings, and moneys from fund raisers. The funds raised for Special Mission Recognitions, Gift to Mission, Gifts in Memory, and the World Thank Offering may or may not be itemized in the budget, but all the funds are also sent to the district treasurer budgeted or not.

But for now, as we close out the end of this year, I invite you to explore an idea from a book that I found at annual gathering called: “Learning to Walk in the Dark” by Barbara Brown Taylor. Her introduction opened with these lines that caught my attention: *“Come inside now, it’s getting dark.” ‘That is my mother speaking, saying the same thing she said every night when she looked out the kitchen window and saw that the sun was going down.’*

How many of you can relate to that time of childhood freedom...of our times of running around the neighborhood all day long? But then...it got dark, and we had to go inside to be safe. This made me stop to think about my life now – especially as I age! Even today, I feel safe and sound in my well-lit home, with the music blaring or the TV on, mostly so that I don’t feel so lonely. The early darkness of winter can set the stage for seasonal depression and anxiety – especially with the rush and fuss of upcoming holiday stresses! It IS a joyful time of the year, but it can become stressful, when we fall prey to let the darkness invade and overcome our spirit.... There is SO much to do! And, what does “darkness” mean, anyway?? This author seems to point to the idea that it is in those times of darkness, when God shows up in new and intriguing ways!

What do you think? Let us find some ways to talk about it in the new year ahead! Thankfully, we KNOW that the Good News is this: Advent is the waiting time, and then...the manger is AGLOW with God’s beautiful gift of LIGHT! Jesus is born in that light, and shines upon us, every single day! Let us walk in His Light in the months ahead...even when those everyday shadows of darkness may fall upon us: HE IS THERE, and we will learn from it!

2023 Conference Annual Gathering is a Success

The Conference Annual Gathering hosted by the wonderful women of the United Women of Faith at Lake Street UMC, Eau Claire was surely a Mosaic of Faith as the 2023 Program theme implies. Some of us started early Friday morning to reach Hope Village in Chippewa Falls at 10 AM through a driving rain. Hope Village is a tiny home village serving homeless people of the Chippewa Valley, providing shelter and hope for the future. We learned how in 2016 the tiny homes were built until there were ten with plans for sixplexes in the future. We learned how to make laundry soap, dryer sheets and dryer balls from home ingredients to economize and save the environment. Mike Cohoon, Director of Hope Village, was our Saturday keynote speaker. After lunch, we headed to the Chippewa Valley Museum to learn the history of the Eau Claire and Chippewa Falls area from explorer days to present. Then on to the sculpture walk in downtown Eau Claire hosted by Deb Pattee, Vice-President who organized the entire event and did a fantastic job. Three of us walked two miles in the rain crossing the Eau Claire River twice on walking bridges looking at all the fantastic sculptures made by various artists on display. This was our designated Move 4 Missions event.

We entered the church and registered for the Annual Gathering at 5 p.m. receiving a booklet with a Mosaic of Faith cross design on it made by Deb Pattee's son. We were greeted by Jan Voss, Registrar, Rita Houser, President of UWFaith Lake Street and Annette Pederson, NW Treasurer. Irene Verdegan led the singing with Karol Hommen, pianist. Linda Caprariello led us in worship on loving one another and modeling a fruitful tree both Friday and Saturday a.m. Both days, Sarah Aiken-Felling led us in guided somatic meditation and exercises in breath and body awareness. Kerri Parker, Director of the Wisconsin Council of Churches was our keynote speaker on Friday night on the subject of Difficult Conversations.

Saturday was a full day. Heidi Careaga, National Finance Chair, talked about Move 4 Missions and the three new initiatives: to inspire, to influence and to impact on our website. Mike Cohoon's talk on the development of Hope Village was followed by a foot and hand washing led by Rev. Barbara Certa-Werner. Gloria Carter conducted the business meeting and Conference Officers were installed. After a wonderful lunch served by the Lake Street UWFaith group, we spread out for 5 breakout sessions: ministries of the Chippewa Falls Mission Coalition, Kairos Prison Ministry, Our Whole Lives Matter, Why Gardening is good for us, and Shaping Destiny video and discussion. Each was a learning event of its own with heartrending stories, uplifting conversation and mindful awareness of the environment and what it can do for your health. We concluded with communion led by Rev. Jerry Morris of Lake St. UMC.

We all went home renewed in faith and spirit, strength to serve others and happiness from being with our United Women in Faith sisters.

Evaluations echoed many sentiments like, "We all fit together, telling our story as a part of God's story, the Friday events were terrific, the liturgy and Bible passages were awesome, foot and hand washing ceremony meaningful, I got lots of ideas for a Soul Care Retreat, Chippewa Valley has a great coalition to reduce homelessness, value of tiny houses and mentorship. Innovative project—should be shared with other cities. Enthusiasm, information and friendship. It was exceptional and I will encourage more people to attend.

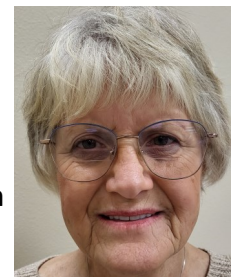

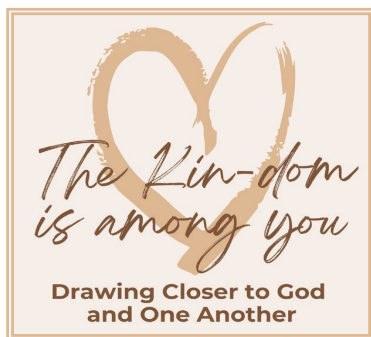

Mabel Heil Scholarship Fund Wisconsin Conference

The Mabel Heil Scholarships are made possible by earnings from a trust established in the will of Sarah Mabel Heil, a resident of Cuba City, Wisconsin. Funds are awarded by the Heil Scholarship Committee of the Wisconsin Conference United Women in Faith and are invested in the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation. Any Wisconsin United Methodist woman working to improve her education may apply.

Available Funds:

- a. Funds will be invested in the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation, in a fund split 60 percent equity and 40 percent fixed.
- b. Funds available to provide scholarships for each semester will be calculated as 2.5 percent of the fair market value of the Mabel Heil Scholarship Fund as of the end of the month prior to the approval of Scholarships.

Eligibility Requirements:

- a. Must be a female member of the United Women in Faith and/or United Methodist Church, Wisconsin.
- b. Submit a written answer to the question, "In what ways do I consider myself a worthy student?"
- c. Letter of recommendation from either the president of the local UWFaith unit or from your pastor.
- d. Letter of recommendation from a church member who is not a member of your household and is not a relative. (Person writing letter on behalf of applicant is to send the letter directly to the contact person)
- e. All letters must be written (Preferably typed) on one side of an 8.5x11" sheet of white paper using black ink.

Application Procedures:

- a. Awarded for one semester at a time. To be considered again for any subsequent semester, send letter asking to be considered.
- b. Graduate students may apply for each semester as long as they meet the other requirements
- c. Application and two (2) letters of recommendation OR RECONSIDERATION LETTER must be received by May 1 for the fall semester or October 1 for the spring semester. Checks will be disbursed by August 15 and January 15.
