Community Gardens as Mission

This year at Annual Conference there was an additional day of learning for laity at the end of the formal sessions. Many different workshops were offered for attendees. The workshop day was open to any one wishing to attend, not just members of Annual Conference. I decided to attend a workshop on "local mission" little knowing that it would actually be about community gardening!

Rev. Dawn Ramstad and her husband lead our session in English. Rev. Maribel Celiz lead a separate workshop on the same topic in Spanish (want other resources on environmental justice in Spanish? - try <http://www.eco-justicia.blogspot.com/>). All three had started their work in Beloit turning church lawns (did you know that lawn is the number one US crop?) and blighted spaces into gardens. By combining urban renewal with the power of faithful volunteers, a thriving mission outreach

was created.

Empty lots where gangs and drug users lingered were transformed into pumpkin patches. Planted as "Sharing gardens" All of the food was available for any who wished to use it—after all you cannot steal what is being given away.

Food was also collected for canning or for use in the local food pantry allowing for even greater abundant blessings to be shared.

So? Why not trade in that lawn mower for a hoe and start your own mission outreach?



The quadrennial theme for our conference is "Living the Fruit of the Spirit". We must plant new seeds to reap a harvest of mission!

State Legislative Action Day: Public Transportation

I was part of the 2013 legislative action day as part of People of Faith United for Justice. This event takes place every two years as the state legislature considers our next budget. One of the proposals we were advocating was for a reverse in cuts made to public transportation funds by the previous 2011-2013 budget. Public transportation enables members of our communities to travel to work (48%), medical appointments (11%), education opportunities (23%) and shop/visit (18%). This is critical for reducing air pollution, reducing traffic congestion and enabling seniors and persons with disabilities and those with limited incomes to live self-sufficient lives. Strong public transit systems

create stronger communities.

When I was a graduate student, I rode the Madison metro bus every day. Although I had a car, I saved money on gas and car maintenance at a time when my income was very low!



Keep the wheels of the buses rolling!

The need to support and advocate for public transportation options continues! Contact your state assembly person and state senator and lift your voice in support of living better together!
