Holding a sign "remember those in prison", I was in the Senate Parlor at the State Capitol on Wed. 7/9/14 at a press conference for a WISDOM rally on the broken parole system in our Wisconsin State Prisons. It is part of the continuing 11x15 Campaign for Justice which aims to reduce the state prison population from 22,000 to 11,000 by 2014. I did not recognize any of the more than 100 people who gathered in an effort to call attention to this situation.

2. Heartland team members will deliver a uniform message to Sister Units.

We are happy that most units have been involved in some fashion. A suggestion that I have is to give all the members a list of the criteria when they come

Several groups do this already. Also someone can check if a certain number of these books are in your public library and then you would not have to purchase them.

We can all participate in Mission giving or designated Mission giving such as Call to Prayer and Self-Denial offering or the Thank Offering box. All units can concentrate on becoming “green” units. We can wash dishes instead of using paper plates and throwing them away. These are a few suggestions to become more involved.

- Encourage the young women of your church to become more involved in UMW. We older gals need to continue to work for women and children all over the world, and we need to set good examples, as well as, being active participants in UMW.
- Have a vision of what we units can do. Have you ever struggled to see, to read, to drive, to sew etc? When we can see, do we really see? For example, do we see spring leaves on trees, flowers blooming, butterflies, etc.? God created all of this natural beauty for us. Do we really see the people around us, the value of each person? Or do we just see the poverty, the physical appearance or disability?



The theme of our one-day conference was "There's just something about that name," focusing on the person of Jesus. Dan spoke to us about the heart of Jesus and the story of the feeding of the 5,000 in Matthew 14:13-21. Then we learned about the mind of Jesus

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in Philippians 2:1-13. Lastly, we focused on the spirit of Jesus in Galatians 5:22-23 where we learned about the fruit of the spirit.

## MISSION COORDINATOR FOR SOCIAL ACTION

### 2014 Mission Action Day

On April 5, 2014, 96 individuals gathered for Mission Action Day at Peace Kaukauna United Methodist Church. Pastor Heather Brewer and Lt. Steve Elliott presented a riveting update on Human Trafficking. Pastor Brewer stated, “**Ending Human Trafficking begins when communities and individuals stand up and proclaim that everybody is a person of sacred worth, and we will not accept that anyone should live in slavery.**”

We are called to be sanctuaries for individuals at risk for human trafficking or who are being trafficked. Individuals at risk or vulnerable for human trafficking include oppressed or marginalized groups, inhabitants of impoverished or disaster areas. Native American women are particularly at risk in Wisconsin. Also at risk are individuals with drug dependency, runaways and at-risk youth (youth who are couch surfing), migrant workers, temporary foreign workers, and undocumented immigrants.

What we can do to impact Human Trafficking:

- Contact your legislator to support Safe Harbor legislation.
- Fight pornography (children are routinely exposed to pornography by 6-7 years of age).
- Join/support advocacy groups [e.g.- exploit no more Milwaukee, Fierce Freedom Eau Claire, Polaris Project, Men Against the Trafficking of Others (MATTOO)].
- Wisconsin Board of Church and Society is in process of setting up a website on Human Trafficking.
- Heather Brewer is in the process of forming 4 teams throughout the state to do presentations to local churches. Contact Heather if you would like to become a member of a team.

- Contact your local Entertainment magazines and request that they do not accept advertisements from escort services.

The afternoon session on Elder Abuse was presented by Diane Mandler, Supervisor Crisis Intervention and Adult Protective Services, Outagamie Department of Health and Human Services. Contact your county's Human Services Department for follow-up of elder abuse concerns. Updates included information on Mission U, Immigration Reform, and the 11x15 WISDOM project.

April 5 was a National Day of Action to Stop Deportations and Expand Administrative Relief from Deportation. The sanctuary at Peace UMC was available for individuals to pray to stop deportations after the Mission Action Day.

Make 2014 an action year.

## NOTES FROM WISCONSIN CONFERENCE UMW HISTORIAN

History Highlight of Wisconsin Rapids United  
Methodist Women

“The Ladies Aid Society in Grand Rapids was organized in September 1848. Six ladies met to talk

over the advisability of forming themselves into a society as there was no church there at that time. They decided to meet weekly in members' homes. Refreshments at that first meeting consisted of hot biscuits and fresh blackberry jam. One member gave each enough homespun yarn to knit six pairs of socks. They voted to have a supper at the largest home and sell their work. Those socks sold for 75 cents a pair and the supper was a great success. This was the first money made to further their Christian work.

The Methodist Episcopal Church of Grand Rapids was organized in 1859. On November 5, 1890, the Methodist Ladies Aid Society was officially organized. Some of the By-laws were: all ladies of the congregation were eligible for membership by paying a 23 cents initiation fee; weekly dues shall be 5 cents; meetings weekly at residences of members; all tattling/unnecessary talk about absent members strictly forbidden; the society shall not encourage anything contrary to God's work or the welfare of the church.

In 1911, the Grand Rapids Methodist Episcopal Church had 4 Ladies Aid Societies – believed to lead the conference in this. All Ladies Societies were given the use of the basement for their meetings by the Church Board in 1934.

came to tell of the many ways our money had been put to work.

In 1959, the Ladies Aid Society became WSCS, Women's Society of Christian Service. At that time we recorded 204 members in 10 circles plus a Wesleyan Service Guild.

The UMW was formed in 1974, replacing WSCS and Wesleyan Guild. Shirley Carpenter became District president of UMW – a first from our church. The annual UMW Conference meeting was held here in 1975 and 1976.

At present, (this was written in 1984), UMW is composed of over 100 ladies in 8 circles. We meet for a general UMW meeting the first Wednesday of the month in the church lounge. We have 2 morning circles, 2 evening circles, and the remainder meet in the afternoon. The first Saturday of October has been our fall bazaar with all the groups' contributions divided between missions and our local church debt."
