*District Member* --Rev. Valerie Fons, ordained elder appointed by the Michigan and Wisconsin conferences and endorsed by the General Board of Higher Education & Ministry as chaplain to Bread & Water, Tipping Bucket Farm & Retreat, and L.A.U.N.C.H., Inc., extension ministries in a specialized site.

For this edition of The Shofar, Northeast District Newsletter, Jan Stanko asked; "What goes on at Washington Island?" The image that comes to mind is a car turning into the driveway at the 55- acre Tipping Bucket Farm & Retreat where I live, house staff and rent pet friendly accommodations. When the car comes to a stop and the doors open, kids are unstrapped from their car seats, climb out of the car and start running around and around the yard, free and glad. The yard is shielded from the road by a row of tall pines and expanse of grass. Kids run toward horses, looking at the chickens and potbellied pig in a chorus of; "Can I touch?" The kids can't seem to stop moving from the barn to the garden and wow; "Look, it's a tractor." The parents are more likely to seek the door of their room and begin carrying luggage.

I love my work as innkeeper. Following Henri Nouwen's definition of hospitality; "Making space for the other," and, following the biblical truth; "With God all things are possible," even when the baseball team arrives for the big game tomorrow. Players riding in the truck bed with a mammoth cooler of beer, and no reservation. The island is jammed with visitors. One could imagine the island might sink as the winter population of 650 people swell to thousands during summer season. "No vacancy" signs abound. At Tipping Bucket Farm and Retreat, we put linens and blankets on cots, couches, roll away, and pew in the wood-floor sanctuary to house all the team members.

"What goes on in Washington Island?" Radical hospital and teen vocational training at the Bread & Water ministry café, the only restaurant in town that does not serve alcohol. The Bread & Water ministry café is where communion is served at table for those making request. A prayer post receives written prayer cards and morning prayer begins each day before breakfast service. A man walked in the door one morning. "Do you serve breakfast?" he asked. "Yes," I answered. Then he saw the cross; "Do you serve those who do not believe?" I welcomed him to a table. We serve all, those who cannot pay, people who need to cry, those espousing conspiracy theories, people intent upon using the internet. We believe Psalm 24:7 -" Lift up your heads, O ye gates; and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall come in." Pg 4

We serve the Holy in all shapes and sizes, faith traditions and cultural and gender diversity.

When Covid happened on Washington Island, we transitioned to outdoor dining, curbside and take-out. The Town of Washington Utility District brought a port-o-can for outdoor use. We set up a hand washing station with water, soap and paper towels. Lines of people seeking relief from the cities began to overtake the limits of our small staff. We were not alone. Restaurants in Door County, summer season, 2021, became overwhelmed with travelers seeking relief and nourishment.

In years past, my ministry at Bread & Water had been focused with the travelers but in 2021, the needs of the staff became my focus due to the intense stress mounting with the unprecedented numbers of travelers. Our ministry of welcoming and serving was challenged with the needs of self-care for staff in the midst of intense challenges for personal and professional growth, a resistance to blame and shame as each staff member revealed their vulnerabilities in managing stress while struggling with the increasing needs for team building and adaptive leadership.

Matthew, a Bread & Water cook had this to say; “We can make this work. If Jesus fed multitudes with very few things, we are capable of serving many with very few hands. Everyone is broken but it’s all about how you are able to persevere through it. It’s like Robin Williams said; “You never know what someone else is going through. Be kind always.” In rehab, I learned life is a challenge always and if it wasn’t, we weren’t doing it right. I think and pray for that peace that surpasses everyone’s understanding.”

Bread & Water staff sought peace in the midst of tempers flaring, all tables full, hungry travelers at the door and weary travelers needing a room for the night.

In addition to Tipping Bucket Farm & Retreat, Bread & Water café, lodging, kayak rentals and the Paddling Museum, Lake Adventures Uniting Nature & Children with Hospitality, (L.A.U.N.C.H.), Inc., a 501C3 environmental education center housed in the Butterfly House is open Memorial Day to Labor Day. An intern manages the house with daily tours. Live butterflies transform from egg to caterpillar, cocoon and hatch, then fly free after butterfly wings pump to dry.

We do ministry on Washington Island. Seeking to be faithful. Growing with open hearts, minds and hands. Rev. Valerie Fons

## *Social Action*

Want to share with you some information that I found to be almost unbelievable about the rate of African-American incarceration in Wisconsin.

The highly respected Sentencing Project recently released a report on the rate of imprisonment for African- American people in the US. The report shows that in our country, an African- American person is five times more likely to be incarcerated in a state prison than a white person is. Amid this grim national picture, Wisconsin again has the highest rate of African- American incarceration of any state in the nation. Nationally, one out of every 81 Black people is in prison; in Wisconsin, it is one out of every 36. While only about 6% of Wisconsin residents are African- American, 42% of the state prison population is African- American.

The report lays out some of the specific reasons for this tremendous disparity. But, it makes clear that the blame is shared by many, including the general lack of equal opportunity for Black people throughout our society.

In Wisconsin, we think of ourselves as fair and friendly people. We don't imagine ourselves as the harshest, least hospitable people in the country. Still, the results tell a different story. Ten years ago, a national study showed Wisconsin to have the highest incarceration rate for African- American people, and this week we have learned that we still hold that reprehensible #1 position.

In the coming days and weeks, WISDOM leaders will be laying out plans to respond to this report. It is time for our state to recognize that significant things have to change if we want to live up to our values. In the meantime, please take a minute to look at the report and or read the article. And, please share them with someone.

Though it is embarrassing we can't let this be a secret, Our state can't solve its big problem until it acknowledges that it exists.


