OUR MISSION COORDINATOR FOR EDUCATION AND INTERPRETATION--

Of Interest-----

The criteria for Mission Today reporting is still a good guide for program planning. However, the reporting is no longer emphasized by National. I enjoy reading Local Unit Report Forms but they are not required.

India Mission-----

A team of clergy and lay conducted a VIM project in India in December. The purpose of the trip was pastoral training for local pastors and dedication of the new classrooms at the St. John's School in Madurai. Those of us not involved in training visited Methodist churches and institutions. In Delhi we visited the Methodist School for the Blind and the Butler School for Girls. These were projects started by missionaries to India. We learned from the Bishop that his education had been sponsored by a Methodist family in the U.S. His life would have been quite different without this education, and the Methodist Church in Delhi would be quite different without his leadership.

In Ahmedabad, we visited Vasad Methodist Bible Seminary, Nadiad Methodist Hospital, the Methodist School of Nursing and Dharmsinh Desai Memorial Methodist Institute of Cardiology and Cardiovascular Surgery. The November 2017 *response* featured an article about this hospital. It is "state of the art." But that was not the case of other missionary hospitals. Especially in rural areas. They struggle because funding is inadequate and they cannot recruit and retain medical staff. Physicians can make more money in private hospitals and clinics. Also they are leaving the country. This means equipment is outdated and the services provided are limited. We learned that a very common problem for farm workers is contamination or poisoning from pesticides they are exposed to in the fields. The nursing school has an outstanding reputation and sponsoring a student is something a UMW unit could consider.

In Hyderabad we visited the Methodist School of Engineering, Fairview Methodist School hostel and church, Moinabad District Methodist School and hostel for girls, and the Moinabad District Methodist Hospital. The Moinabad school had an enrollment of about 2,000 students when it was an English medium school. That is no longer the case. When the mission support from the U.S. ended, fewer children could be brought to the hostel and to the school. Now there are less than 75 students and no hostel for boys. That building was abandoned some years ago and could be beyond repair. There was a John Wesley Statute nearby so our photography fans needed to stop for pictures.

In Chennai we attended the Tamil Methodist Church's centennial celebration. This was the church Sam Royoppa served before he came to the U.S. We also spent a day at the Anita School and Opportunity School. This school was featured in a *response* article several years ago. There are approximately 2000 students in the Anita English medium school. The Opportunity School works with children with a wide range of physical and mental challenges. But it is housed in a building needing major repairs. A group in Texas is raising money for this repair work. A neighborhood mission church and the New Life Charity Mission were also stops by our group. New Life Charity Mission is located in a rural area where the program provides assistance to women who lack adequate clothing, food, medical care and appropriate social contacts.

In Madurai we did some painting maintenance at the Philip and Timothy Stains Memorial Home. But most important was the dedication of new classrooms at the St. John's School. These classrooms were made possible in part by a gift from the Marge Wendt Estate. Our visits at the various projects could be summarized with a couple of thoughts: (1) The Methodist furor for mission in the early 1900's resulted in projects that enhanced the lives of many people. (2) Now the financial support for many of these projects is minimal or nonexistent. (3) This mission spirit needs a lot of help if this work is to continue. (4) How we perpetuate this mission spirit is a measure of how we value and respect the missionaries who devoted and sacrificed so much to be an example of Christ's teachings.

I am hoping that with time, I can change the way people look at the UMW. We are definitely more than the kitchen ladies!

As a group of Godly women, we have a voice and a commission from God to effect change and transform the world. Matthew 5:16 says; "In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven." (NIV) Let's all be the light that God calls us to be in a world filled with darkness.

I am looking forward to working with all of you and getting to know more sisters in faith.

MABEL HEIL SCHOLARSHIP

The Mabel Heil Scholarships are a result of funds from the will of Sarah Mabel Heil, a woman from Cuba City, Wisconsin. The first scholarships were granted in 1981. Since then more than 240 women have received help with their education.

Requirements and Instructions

Instructions:

1. Be a female member of Wisconsin Conference United Methodist Women.
2. Submit a written answer to the question, "In what way do I consider myself a worthy student?"
3. Send the completed application form to the contact person by May 1 for the Fall semester or October 1 for the Spring semester.
4. Request that a letter of recommendation be sent to the contact person by the president of the local United Methodist Women or the pastor of the church.
5. Request that a letter of recommendation be sent to the contact person by a church member who is not a member of your household and is not a relative.

Rules:

Any member of Wisconsin Conference United Methodist Women working to improve her education may apply.

Please have all letters written (preferably typed) on one side of 8 1/2 by 11 sheet of white paper using black ink.

All applications are photocopied for the committee members.

Scholarships are awarded one semester at a time. To be considered again DURING a one-year period, you must send a letter asking to be considered. AFTER one year, you will need to fill out another form and secure new recommendations.

If in any given year there is an increase of applications, these priorities will be followed: Women responsible for others will be favored. Women preparing to return to the employment field will be favored.

Application and two (2) letters of recommendation must be postmarked no later than May 1 and October 1 to be considered.

Schedule:

1st Semester: Apply by May 1; notified by June 1; check sent by August 15.

2nd Semester: Apply by October 1; notified by November 1; check sent by December 1.

— Limitless —

Limitless introduces young women to United Methodist Women but in a different way and with a fresher approach that appeals to the younger generation.

Young women want to get more active with women's groups at their church, but they look around and only see their mother's group or their grandmother's group. Limitless is a chance for them to engage with other United Methodist Women in their age range in a way that fits their styles and needs.

Meetings are a key difference. Traditional United Methodist Women meetings usually involve going to the church at a set time to engage with other women face-to-face. But Limitless meetings might be on Snapchat or Skype or FaceTime. Missions are very hands-on, such as feeding the homeless or bringing clothes to the needy, and they also engage specifically with issues that young women of their generation are passionate about: teen pregnancy, college life, bullying, maternal health, gender wage gap, globalization, multiculturalism and more.

At Mission u there are studies and activities that are planned just for young women. At the Conference Annual Meeting, Girls Night Out is planned by the Young Women's Coordinators for the Young Women.

To encourage young women to become involved with United Methodist Women, please encourage young women to attend Mission u and Girls Night Out at the Annual Gathering.
