- ASSIGN A ZOOM ADMINISTRATOR TO MONITOR THE COMPUTER AND CHAT.
- QUESTIONS CAN BE SUBMITTED ON ZOOM CHAT BY THE ADMINISTRATOR.
- ENSURE TECH SUPPORT AVAILABLE FOR YOUR WATCH PARTY.
- TEST YOUR EQUIPMENT FOR ZOOM PRIOR TO THE DAY OF THE EVENT.
- CONSIDER HAVING PARTICIPANTS SIT AT TABLES WITH PAPER & WRITING UTENSILS FOR NOTE TAKING.
- SHARE YOUR EVENT ON CHURCH AND SOCIAL MEDIA, CHURCH-WIDE, AND COMMUNITY-WIDE.
- OFFER CHILDCARE TO ALLOW YOUNG MOMS TO PARTICIPATE.
- CONNECT TO LOCAL SOCIAL ACTION GROUPS-WISDOM AFFILIATES.
- TAKE AN OFFERING FOR NORTHCOTT NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE.

In October, United Methodist Children's Services in Milwaukee announced that they changed their name to *Rooted & Rising – Washington Park.* 

Since its establishment in 1962 as a nonprofit social service agency of the United Methodist Church, this agency has been dedicated to uplifting and empowering those they serve. In the early 1990's, the agency put down roots in Milwaukee's Washington Park neighborhood and has proudly called it home ever since. This new name reflects the agency's determination to work in true partnership with individuals and families in the Washington Park neighborhood to establish strong, resilient roots, to continue growing, and to rise to reach their full potential. Rooted & Rising - Washington Park operates a wide range of essential programs designed to meet the diverse needs and priorities of the community:

1. Quality, Affordable Housing: Multifaceted housing program, consisting of a 72-unit supportive rental housing portfolio and new development initiatives to promote homeownership, is predicated on the belief that all families deserve safe, affordable, and high-quality housing as an essential foundation upon which to meet basic needs and build for the future.

2. Neighborhood Engagement: A Neighborhood Engagement Team (NET) supports residents and collaborates with partners to build community, enhance the quality of life, advocate for change and shape the future of the Washington Park neighborhood.

3. Childcare Services: Growing Tree Children's Center offers high-quality, affordable early childhood education, ensuring that parents can pursue their dreams while their children learn and grow in a safe, caring, and compassionate environment.

4. Food Security: The Community Food Center is a dignity-centered, warm, and welcoming place for residents to access free and nutritious food and other basic need items, receive direct assistance from service providers, and get connected to other resources and community-building opportunities at the neighborhood level.

5. Social Work Assistance: Social work outreach focuses on helping individuals and families meet basic needs, overcome crises and unexpected challenges, and strive to achieve their dreams.

# Notes from our Program Resources Coordinator, Susan Shapiro

#### 2024 Reading Program (Go to uwfaith.org/read for listing of recommended books)

#### Tips on Improving Reading Program Participation:

1. Set a good example. Promote *enthusiastically* good books you have read. A good time is at the UWF General Meetings or Circle Meetings; I found success in reading a program book and then discussing it at our Circle meetings.

2. Start a Book Club. It would only take one book every two months to finish the program. There are plenty of great books to discuss.

3. Encourage your significant other to join you. Gives you something to talk about during these long winters.

4. To get you started, the following are three program books that I received positive comments on:

# BRAIDING SWEETGRASS by Robin Wall Kimmerer (Spiritual Growth)

As a botanist, Kimmerer is trained to ask questions of nature with the tools of science. As a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, she embraces the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. Here she brings these two lenses together. Drawing on her life as an Indigenous scientist and a woman, Kimmerer shows how other living beings offer us gifts and lessons even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. She circles toward a central argument: that the awakening of ecological consciousness requires acknowledgement and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world.

THE DEATH AND LIFE OF AIDA HERNANDEZ: A BORDER STORY by Aaron Bobrow-Strain (Ed. for Mission)

This book tells the story of a Mexican teen mother, Aida, journeying through the U.S. immigration system and the obstacles she faces. Aida was born in Mexico in 1987. When Aida was 8 years old, her mother took her and her siblings to live in Arizona, where she grew up undocumented. After her deportation, Aida found herself in a Mexican city marked by violence, in a country not hers, and separated from her son. To get back to the United States and reunite with her son, she embarked on a harrowing journey, enduring detention centers, immigration courts, and more.

# LEAD FROM THE OUTSIDE: HOW TO BUILD YOUR FUTURE AND MAKE REAL CHANGE by Stacey Abrams (Leadership Development)

Stacy Abrams, one of the most prominent Black female politicians in the U.S., offers this necessary handbook for harnessing the strengths of being an outsider when it comes to leadership. Abrams argues that knowing your own passion is the key to success, and she draws from her experience and hard-won insights to break down how ambition, fear, money, and failure function in leadership, while offering personal stories that illuminate practical strategies. Differences in race, gender, and class are surmountable, she asserts. The trick is to proactively use this "otherness" while recognizing internal fears.

# **Mabel Heil Scholarships**

The Mabel Heil Scholarships are made possible by earnings from a trust established in the will of Sarah Mabel Heil, a resident of Cuba City, Wisconsin. Funds are awarded by the Heil Scholarship Committee of the Wisconsin Conference UWF and are invested in the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation. Any Wisconsin United Methodist woman working to improve her education may apply.

#### Available Funds:

a. Funds will be invested in the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation, in a fund split 60 percent equity and 40 percent fixed.

b. Funds available to provide scholarships for each semester will be calculated as 2.5 percent of the fair market value of the Mabel Heil Scholarship Fund as of the end of the month prior to the approval of Scholarships.

#### **Eligibility Requirements:**

a. Must be a female member of the UWF and/or United Methodist Church, Wisconsin.

b. Submit a written answer to the question, "In what ways do I consider myself a worthy student?"

c. Letter of recommendation from either the president of the local UWFaith unit or from your pastor.

d. Letter of recommendation from a church member who is not a member of your household and is not a relative. (Person writing letter on behalf of the applicant is to send the letter directly to the contact person.)

e. All letters must be written (preferably typed) on one side of an 8.5x11" sheet of white paper using black ink,

#### **Application Procedures:**

a. Awarded for one semester at a time. To be considered again for any subsequent semester, send a letter asking to be considered.

b. Graduate students may apply for each semester if they meet the other requirements.

c. Application and two (2) letters of recommendation OR RECONSIDERATION LETTER must be received by May 1 for the fall semester or October 1 for the spring semester. Checks will be disbursed by August 15 and January 15.
