Psalm 46:10 "Be still and know that I am God" has become my daily prayer. I need to remind myself that all that matters is today, this moment.

The March-April issue of RESPONSE has been on the coffee table for days now but this morning, the first rays of the sunrise fell on the cover and the beautiful smile of Juana Parraga Alano, of the Methodist Women's Federation in Bolivia. It took my breath away. My mind went back to 1971 and our unforgettable trip from Buenos Aires, Argentina to La Paz Bolivia on board a narrow-gauge train with our two young boys, to visit a Methodist pastor and his family. It reminded me why I am a United Methodist Woman. Every place we visited in our travels in South and Central America, the welcome by our "church host families" was the same, **you are FAMILY**. Our faith in God and our love for mission work, opened the doors to see "where our money goes" and how we reach across the miles to change lives and make a difference.

We may not be able to "go" and meet in person during COVID-19 but we can still share our PURPOSE and meet our pledges. I challenge you to open RESPONSE and travel through each page and be changed!

First: look at the photo of the woman on the cover, and wonder how YOU have contributed to that life. Second: go to page 2 and "really look" THINK, LEARN, LIVE, GIVE, LISTEN, ACT, PRAY. I challenge you to look at those headings as the lights on an airport runway, you are the pilot, ready for take-off!

LEARN, each bright colored page is a message from one of our sisters at the National office reminding us of our legacy, our Purpose and our Mission. Make each one a message written specially for you. Make it your personal story, or the trip you want to take, and then share your experience or dream with others. Make a phone call to anyone of the friends you miss and think how you can be part of the adventure, different as it is now, let your imagination fly. Work on new ways together. I love to call a friend and say "I heard on the radio..." or "I read in the paper... Why not start your call with "Did you see the article in RESPONSE magazine on...."

GIVE, our foremothers set aside 2 cents a day and prayer, you can label a quart jar with 25 or 50 cents a day and a prayer and watch that multiply. When World Thank Offering comes, your joy will overflow when you see your Treasurer's face!! (you may volunteer to help her carry the change jars to the bank). Don't be sad that you cannot hold your in-person fund raisers to fulfill your pledge, there is always loose change you can put in another jar with a different label. Watch the blessings multiply. Do things differently until we go back to "normal again".

LISTEN, ACT, PRAY – that is what makes us UNITED METHODIST WOMEN! Celebrate today, that is all God is asking us to do!

Message from our District Superintendent

Christian Coping Strategies for COVID 19 Churches: From Echoes of Scripture

Dear beloved sisters,

Your faithful ministry to the Church in this season is as essential as it is challenging. COVID 19 coping strategies have been central in my prayer life for the last year. Lord, what will you have me do? How shall I follow you and lead others? Many bible verses tumble through my conscience as I listen for guidance. Isaiah, Paul in his letter to Romans and Jesus' words in Luke come readily into my mind.

I hear the echoes of **Isaiah 43: 1-4; 18-19**

1 But now, this is what the Lord says----- he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine. 2 When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze. 3 For I am the Lord, your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior; I give Egypt for your ransom, Cush and Seba in your stead. 4 Since you are precious and honored in my sight, and because I love you, I will give men in exchange for you, and people in exchange for your life. 18 Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. 19 See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the desert and streams in the wasteland.

Isaiah reminds us to remember God's love and God's abiding presence in the midst of trouble. Isaiah reminds us that we live in a world of change. "Forget the former things, and do not dwell on the past" we are admonished. God is doing a new thing, making a way for us through the wilderness. How very difficult it is for us to give up our old habits and practices! We grieve what we loved, what was familiar and what was comfortable. We might not want to change, but just go back to how things were. This change is hard. We may not agree with our siblings in Christ on whether or how we should make changes. The numbers are changing, the virus is mutating, our scientists are learning more every day and hence the guidance we receive is in constant flux. How long O Lord!?

Sometimes it is so hard to see the way God is making in the pandemic wilderness. What if we look upon the profound disruptions in our way of living and worshipping as a holy opportunity? A holy opportunity is an invitation from God. We pray “Thy kingdom come, Thy (not my) will be done.” What is God’s will for us in this season? Discerning God’s will for the future, rather than returning to the past must be our primary task. Nonetheless, we yearn to return to our buildings to discern even this task. Some of us are already settling back in. How far apart should we stand? Do we still wear masks even if we are vaccinated? What about people who aren’t vaccinated? Or can’t or won’t wear a mask? What do we do?

I hear Jesus loud and clear when the lawyer asked about eternal life (**Luke 10:25-37**) that Loving God and loving neighbor are required, and that loving neighbor is often neither convenient nor popular. Loving neighbor is the highest expression of loving God.

How each of us copes with COVID is a matter of context. But it is also a matter of faith. We are not promised an “Easy button,” but we are promised God’s love and abiding presence in this and every challenge. We are also given the tools we need to respond to every holy opportunity.

I began with scripture and as a good United Methodist I close with a hymn and prayer- Sing #140 with me: Great is thy faithfulness! Great is thy faithfulness! Morning by morning new mercies I see, all I have needed thy hand hath provided; great is thy faithfulness, Lord unto me!

May God continue to bless you and keep you safe and faithful, that you may be a beacon of Christ’s love lighting the way in a dark and troubled time.

Social Action

I wanted to share some numbers that relate to our Climate and COVID,

Green New Deal???? How many coal fired power plants area there in the world today?

The EU has 468 -	building 27 more...	Total 495
Turkey has 56 -	building 93 more....	Total 149
South Africa has 79 -	building 24 more...	Total 103
India has 589 -	building 446 more....	Total 1035
Philippines has 19-	building 60 more...	Total 79
South Korea has 58-	building 26 more...	Total 84
Japan has 90 -	building 45 more...	Total 135
China has 2,363 -	building 1,171 more...	Total 3,534

That's 5,615 projected coal powered plants in just 8 countries.

USA has 15 - building 0 more.... Total 15

This makes the point. Whatever the USA does or doesn't do won't make any difference regarding CO2 unless the rest of the world, especially China and India reduce their coal-fired power plants as well. Doesn't matter what political party you favor this is eye opening.

As reported by the CDC (COVID is included)... Here are the US deaths by year and the change from the previous year:

Year 2017 2, 818,503 Americans died

Year 2018: 2,839,205 deaths (20,702 more than the previous year 2017)

Year 2019: 2,855,000 deaths (16,300 more than the previous year 2018)

The year of the pandemic ...

Year 2020: 2,913,144 deaths (57,641 more than the previous year 2019)

BUT WAIT: There were zero deaths from Covid-19 during 2018, and 2019 and the jump from 2019 was only 57,641 ???

I've been told that COVID is responsible for now 400,000 + deaths. Shouldn't the 2020 number be a heck of a lot higher? So the question becomes: How many people died OF COVID and How many died (of other causes) WITH COVID? Now read below

The US Population is 330,000,000 and in 5 months the number of Covid-19 deaths was 130,000. The number of deaths as a percent of the population is 0.03939%, compared to the number of cancer cases diagnosed in 2019 (1,762,450) and 607,000 deaths. This doesn't seem far-fetched because it is happening before our eyes.

Close businesses = 35,000,000+ instantly unemployed.

Remove entertainment and prohibit recreation; Closing parks, gyms, bars, restaurants, sports.

No dating. No touching. Isolate people. Dehumanize them.

Close Temples and Churches prohibit worship. Create a vacuum and let depression, anxiety, hopelessness and desperation set in. Then... ignite hatred and civil unrest, creating Civil War.
