Treasurer's Note

UMW Treasurers,

I am very thankful for the persistence of units in fundraising and giving in 2021. If you and your unit has struggled this past year, you are not alone. Giving has been down significantly in 2021 and we raised only 55% of our pledge. Even with this down turn in the total amount given, we have increased the number of 5-star units to 8 as local units have found creative ways to access all 5-channels of giving during the year. Even though our own district did not make our pledge, low expenditures by all the districts and conference means that our Conference was still able to meet its pledge to National in 2021. This is a significant achievement as we have long struggled to right-size our pledge as a Conference. Mission money has been able to flow to our mission projects, many of which are on the front-lines of the COVID pandemic. I have sent out year-end reports to units who gave in 2021 for your records as well as new forms and updates to all unit treasurers.

I am now your official treasurer for 2022 so please send checks along with the remittance forms to my address in order for your money to be processed in a timely manner. Please make checks out to **South West District UMW** (not to me or to my office). Although I do not believe that local treasurers are in the habit of sending copies of their yearly audit/review to the district treasurer as well as the local president, I hope that you are being contentious and accountable to best practices by going through this process on a yearly basis. We are entrusted with money and it is important to make sure your records are accurate and all transactions are accounted for properly. It is also good practice to send notice for tax filling to anyone who gave more than \$250 to your unit in a year (this has become less important since fewer people itemize their deductions these days, but is still a good idea). As I noted in my letter to local treasurers, certificates are no longer printed with the Special Mission Recognition pins. Feel free to invent and customize certificates from your unit as you award these pins. I also noted that the purchase of Gift in Memory cards has changed. The new Gift in Memory cards no longer have inner tear off receipts. Instead, these cards are purchased upfront as you order them for \$5/each (or you may pay more if you wish to honor someone with a larger amount) the same way Gift to Mission cards have been handled previously. If you need either Gift in Memory or Gift to Mission cards, fill out the card order form and send it to me and I will either send you ones I have or I will order them for you. I look forward to celebrating your mission giving and support in 2022.

No way to grow up

American children are starting 2022 in crisis.

The toll

Children fell far behind in school during the first year of the pandemic and have not caught up. Among third through eighth graders, math and reading levels were all lower than normal this fall, [according to NWEA](#), a research group. The shortfalls were largest for Black and Hispanic students, as well as students in schools with high poverty rates.

“We haven’t seen this kind of academic achievement crisis in living memory,” Michael Petrilli of the Thomas B. Fordham Institute [told Politico](#).

Many children and teenagers are experiencing mental health problems, aggravated by the isolation and disruption of the pandemic. Three medical groups, including the American Academy of Pediatrics, recently declared [a national state of emergency in children’s mental health](#). They cited “dramatic increases in emergency department visits for all mental health emergencies.”

Suicide attempts have risen, slightly among adolescent boys and sharply among adolescent girls. The number of E.R. visits for suspected suicide attempts by 12- to 17-year-old girls rose by 51 percent from early 2019 to early 2021, [according to the C.D.C.](#)

Gun violence against children has increased, as part of a broader nationwide rise in crime. In Chicago, for example, 101 residents under age 20 were murdered last year, up from 76 in 2019. School shootings have also risen: The Washington Post counted 42 last year in the U.S., [the most on record](#) and up from 27 in 2019.co

Many schools have still not returned to normal, worsening learning loss and social isolation. Once-normal aspects of school life — lunchtime, extracurricular activities, assemblies, school trips, parent-teacher conferences, reliable bus schedules — have been transformed if not eliminated.

Behavior problems have increased. “Schools across the country say they’re seeing an uptick in disruptive behaviors,” [Kalyn Belsha of Chalkbeat reported](#). “Some are obvious and visible, like students trashing bathrooms, fighting over social media posts or running out of classrooms. Others are quieter calls for help, like students putting their head down and refusing to talk.”

Kelli Tuttle, a teacher in Madison, Wis., told us, “There is a lot of swearing, vandalism and some fights.”

For the past two years, large parts of American society have decided harming children was an unavoidable side effect of Covid-19. And that was probably true in the spring of 2020, when nearly all of society shut down to slow the spread of a deadly and mysterious virus.

But the approach has been less defensible for the past year and a half, as we have learned more about both Covid and the extent of children's suffering from pandemic restrictions. Data now suggest that many changes to school routines are of questionable value in controlling the virus's spread. Some researchers are skeptical that school closures reduce Covid cases in most instances. Other interventions, like forcing students to sit apart from their friends at lunch, may also have little benefit.

One reason: Severe versions of Covid, including long Covid, are extremely rare in children. For them, the virus resembles a typical flu. Children face more risk from car rides than Covid.

The widespread availability of vaccines since last spring also raises an ethical question: **Should children suffer to protect unvaccinated adults — who are voluntarily accepting Covid risk for themselves and increasing everybody else's risk, too?** Right now, the U.S. is effectively saying yes.

We are in **Emergency Shortage for blood** so please let people know it's more important than ever to sign-up to donate.

We are facing the worst blood shortage in over a decade, with less than a one-day supply of critical blood types in recent weeks.

This is posing a concerning risk to patient care and doctors are facing difficult decisions about who receives blood transfusions and who will need to wait until more products become available. We have experienced a ~10% decline in the number of people donating blood since the pandemic began.

Masks are currently required for everyone regardless of vaccination status.
